Oral Reading Fluency in 4/5C

Over the last few weeks students in 4/5C have been introduced to oral reading fluency and how it can be used to improve their reading comprehension.

In order for reading fluency to be strong, students must have

- Highly accurate word level reading
- Prosody (appropriate phrasing and expression)
- Appropriate speed

Reading aloud with books that have already been read to them, allows for students to self correct their reading.

In their fluency reading pairs, students are reading our class novel, Bindi (written from the perspective of an 11 year old indigenous girl).

Parent/ Carers/ Guardian Survey



From the Assistant Principal

Planning Mathematical Learning Experiences by Looking at Mathematics in a New Way.

Professional development experiences are key essential components for teachers where we now teach in a society that is constantly changing and progressing. Schools are at the cold front of society's expectations where new generations of learners will enter their working lives with skills and jobs/careers that haven't even been designed yet.

This is the ongoing nature of education where teachers are faced with the expectation of having agility to meet these evolving learning needs. We would not do what we do if we did not want to see the success of our students.

Seeing mathematics in a new way has been a core component in my own professional development and I get quite excited at the nature of change and how our learners at WWPS will be in the best hands when learning mathematics.

Meagan Roberts, Sally Woolman and myself became curious learners, mathematicians and opened our minds to the well known researchers, teachers and leaders in maths in Ballarat last week. Among many teachers from around the state, we were honoured to meet and converse with new colleagues and in awe with the knowledge and expertise in one room!

Teaching mathematics with an open mind is the connector piece to enabling capable and numerate students. These are the key takeaways of the days:

- Students need to offer more than one way to get to the answer to show a deeper thinking.
- Estimating always, gives a picture of students' number sense.
- Groupitising we all see the numbers differently but get the same answer.
- Maths in art.
- Playful maths play with it.
- Brain growth and change (neuroplasticity) and importance of the struggle. Embrace the struggle.
- Students need to be at the 'edge' of their understanding.
- Build, draw, make connections all needed and important.
- Physical, visual representations stay in long term memory. Students need to actually feel it, play with it and remember. No matter what age!!
- Big picture thinking and precision thinking should have a balance.
- ISH numbers. Give students the opportunity and confidence to talk and be a part of a conversation, teaching moment. Ish numbers takes away the need to be right, and gives confidence to students to reason their 'ISH'
- Before you calculate or work with precision, give me what you think.
- Visual maths opens perspectives.

With these points in mind, our students are always at the centre of everything we do. Our students are fortunate to have the experts in front of them every single day and to have the opportunities to see mathematics as connections, as real life experiences and developing their key concepts in creative, concrete and relevant ways!

Here are some of the ways we are practicing inclusion in HoL.




Inclusion is accepting everyone's differences.

10, 20, 30, 40, 50, 60, 70 80, 90, 100...we did it! That's plenty!


