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From the Principal Mrs Clare Monk

Dear Families,

Welcome back to week seven of the term! I hope you all enjoyed your long weekend. With the extra day it felt like a little mini break in our term, with only three weeks left of term one.

What a fabulous day of challenge and learning staff had last Friday. The learning was focused on anxiety and the impact it can have on children. The message that was reinforced throughout the day was that without connection, via relationships, some children find it extremely difficult to regulate their behaviour and this then impacts on their ability to learn. Karen Young, childhood psychologist, delivered an evidence-based presentation on how anxiety presents in children offering staff many strategies to manage the 'big' emotions and how to support children to keep them joyful, happy with their 'thinking' brain switched on. We are extremely grateful to our Big Life team for organising the day.

As teachers we understand that building relationships with your child and setting up routines and structures that will support your child to make new friendships, show growth in their learning, feel safe and heard are vital components to help each child flourish. It is important to remember that we have 127 children in the playground. There are going to be incidents and altercations with others. Please be positive with your language. Not all incidents and altercations are deliberate, most are accidents and unfortunately the case when there are so many people sharing a space. The students are learning to connect, solve conflict, ask for help and show stamina and perseverance.

As parents and teachers, we cannot control everything that happens to them or around them. But we can work with them to build their toolbox of strategies to assist them with what they can control, which is how they react to a situation. This may be around conflict resolution, asking for help or looking at all perspectives. It is important to build resilience within your child. This does not mean accepting bad behaviour, but it does mean developing an understanding of how to manage situations. This is the best gift you can give a child. Their skills develop as they practice them and get older, and it means they grow in confidence about how to manage situations that affect them. It lowers anxiety because they know how to get help when they need it and are also able to manage many social situations independently.

#### <u>Naplan</u>

This week NAPLAN testing has started in Years 3 and 5. The students have been practicing using devices over the past couple of weeks. We know that NAPLAN captures student performance on one day and we use this information with others such as PAT testing and work samples to make decisions about student progress. Last year, we improved in all areas of NAPLAN. Our results were all close to, or at or above similar schools, with our biggest improvement in year 5 reading and spelling. Yesterday, students completed the writing test (year 3 paper test and year 5 online), followed by the reading test today. Next week the students will undertake the Numeracy and Language Conventions tests to be completed online. We have set up several 'catchup' sessions across the ten day testing period if your child is absent on any test days.

#### **Athletic Sports**

The Athletics House Sports are being held, next Friday 24th March, on our school oval, commencing approximately 9.15am. Students have been busy practising events and getting ready for the day in PE specialist class. It would be wonderful if all students could come to school wearing coloured shirts representing their house colour. The children will be outside most of the day and they need to be prepared for the activities and weather conditions. Please ensure your children bring a drink bottle, and snacks to last them throughout the day. A BBQ lunch and mini canteen will operate from approximately 11:30 am. BBQ sausages are available for \$2.00. Donuts, hedgehog, zooper doopers and fruit boxes will also be available for purchase. If your child is unsure of their house team, please contact Mr Hackett or our office staff. If you can help out on the day at the mini canteen or on a rotation, please contact Heath Hackett or place your name at the office. It would be great to see as many families as possible come to support their children on this day. House Sports days are about fun, participation and giving your best, while getting active.

#### **School Photos**

Our school photos day is next Thursday 30th of March. All students should have received an individual envelope last week. Each child must return their own envelope on photo day to ensure their order is placed and processed (even if payment is in a sibling's envelope). **Family photos are also available and must if requested and paid prior.** Forms are available at the office. Orders can also be placed online. I ask for families' assistance to ensure that all students are in full school uniform on this day.

#### Safety Drill Rehearsal

The safety of all children and staff in our school is particularly important to us. A requirement of our Emergency Management plan is to conduct termly whole school rehearsals of various safety drills. On Tuesday, we practiced a fire drill to ensure each student understands and is aware of the importance of this drill and not be afraid when the fire alarm is sounded. By practicing they will know what to do and how to do it. Our students and staff response rate to the alarm sounding was swift, with all building evacuated in under four minutes. Well done team!

#### Attendance

We hope to have our students here at school every day. We love having them here and every day they are away they miss valuable learning and have to catch up in some way. We understand that there will be days that they are unwell. When this occurs, please let us know by either ringing the office or logging onto Compass. Just 5 days away a year means that when they finish school here at WWPS they would have missed a term of school. A day away a fortnight means a term's absence in just 2 years. Extended holidays can catch up on children also. We want our children to be here at school so we can support them to reach their full potential academically, socially, and emotionally. If a student is struggling in any way at school, we ask that you contact us, and we will work with you to improve engagement and support them here at school.

#### **School Council**

Our AGM and general meeting will be held next Monday 20<sup>th</sup> of March at 6:30pm in the library where new council members will be welcomed, and office bearers will be elected. The School Council is an elected body of staff and parents that oversee the policy and financial decisions for the school. Our parent positions have now been filled. ### Teaching Respect and Showing Kindness...It is Everyone's Responsibility

The time is certainly flying by this term and as we navigate NAPLAN, timetable changes, testing and illnesses, it is even more crucial to look after ourselves and each other so that everyone can finish the remaining three weeks with positive momentum.

Teaching respect in the classroom is a critical element of classroom management and whole school functional and positive culture. Our staff, along with the Big Life team consider that a respectful classroom is a high performing classroom. A respectful school, is a high performing school.

Respect is characterised by a feeling of sincere admiration for someone or something brought about by qualities they possess, their abilities, or their achievements. Simply put, respect is the regard with which we hold other people, and it's demonstrated through our responses to others, through our intentions and thoughts for other people.

Respect can be demonstrated in various ways, and we can teach students what respect looks like through a range of concrete examples and social situations. Showing respect towards someone else can look different from person to person, depending on a range of factors. In that same regard, the potential for someone to feel disrespected may differ from person to person, dependent on their unique perspective. At Warrnambool West PS, we actively teach general ways to demonstrate respect through teaching the following skills with the understanding that it's a continual learning process:

- Listening when a peer or adult is speaking
- Patiently waiting for a turn during an activity or situation (eg raising your hand or waiting for a turn in a game)
- Following directions and expectations
- Using appropriate language
- Being honest
- Demonstrating kindness to others
- Working cooperatively with peers
- Maintaining a safe body around others
- Demonstrating eye contact and appropriate body language while others are speaking
- Accepting other's boundaries

Of course, this list is not exhaustive as there are numerous ways to teach respect to students. Still, each of the above examples demonstrates a level of respect for the school setting, the students, and the teachers or office staff according to our society and school norms.

With respect being at the forefront of our school values, it is everyone's responsibility and have the right to be respected, feel respected and show respect. Mr. Karen Holdsworth Assistant Principal

NAPLAN tests are one aspect of each school's assessment and reporting process. It does not replace the extensive, ongoing assessments made by teachers about each student's performance. Each teacher will have the best insight into their students' educational process. Parents/carers can use NAPLAN reports, along with other school assessment reports to discuss their child's strengths and area for improvement with their teacher.

NAPLAN results do not measure overall school quality.

NAPLAN is made up of tests in the 4 areas (or 'domains') of:

- Reading
- Writing
- Conventions of Language (spelling, grammar and punctuation)
- Numeracy

To give students the best chance at success, West students in year 3 and 5 have had access to boost sessions to build on their current knowledge and to be given the opportunity to practise the conditions of their upcoming NAPLAN test.

The teaching focus included:

- Underlining key vocabulary/phrases to help answer questions.
- Unpacking some of the more challenging questions especially those that require two or more steps.
- For Language convention to boost their spelling extra sounds-write sessions focused on spelling or 3-4 syllable words.
- Recap/review of concepts such as time, measurement and interpreting data.
- Writing practise in both persuasive and narrative focusing on idea development and organisation of their writing.

#### **CSEF ELIGIBILITY**

Below are the criteria used to determine a student's eligibility for the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF).

#### Criteria 1 - General eligibility

TIC

To be eligible for the fund, a parent or carer of a student attending a registered Government or non-government Victorian primary or secondary school must:

- on the first day of Term one
- · on the first day of Term two
- a) be a holder of one or more of the eligible financially-means tested cards **OR** be a temporary foster parent, and;
- b) submit an application to the school by the due date.

For the list of eligible financially-means tested cards refer to the CSEF Policy: https://www2.education.vic.gov.au/pal/camps-sports-and-excursions-fund/policy

Parents who receive a Carer Allowance on behalf of a child, or any other benefit or allowance not income tested by Centrelink, are not eligible for the CSEF unless they also comply with the above.

#### Criteria 2 - Be of school age and attend school in Victoria

For the purposes of CSEF, students may be eligible for assistance if they attend a Victorian registered primary or secondary school. CSEF is not payable to students attending pre-school, kindergarten, home schooled, or TAFE.

#### **Special Consideration**

A special consideration category exists for

- Families on a bridging visa, temporary protection visa, in community detention or are asylum seeker families
- Students in temporary out of home care arrangements, including statutory kinship care

#### Eligibility Date

For concession card holders CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/carer concession card being validated successfully with Centrelink on the first day of either term one (30 January 2023) or term two (24 April 2023).

#### PAYMENT AMOUNTS

#### CSEF payment amount

The CSEF is an annual payment to the school to be used towards camps, sports and/or excursion expenses for the benefit of the eligible student.

- Primary school student rate: \$125 per year.
- Secondary school student rate: \$225 per year.

The CSEF is paid directly to your child's school and will be allocated by the school towards camps, sports and/or excursion costs for your child.

For ungraded students, the rate payable is determined by the student's date of birth. For more information, see: www.education.vic.gov.au/about/programs/Pages/csef.aspx

Year 7 government school students who are CSEF recipients are also eligible for a uniform voucher. Secondary schools are required to make applications on behalf of parents/carers so please register your interest at the school.

#### HOW TO COMPLETE THE APPLICATION FORM

#### NOTE: ALL SECTIONS MUST BE COMPLETED BY PARENT/LEGAL GUARDIAN

1. Complete the PARENT/CARER DETAILS section.

Make sure that the Surname, First Name, and Customer Reference Number (CRN) details match those on your concession card. You will also need to provide your concession card to the school.

If you are claiming as a temporary Foster Parent or a Veteran Affairs Pensioner, you will need to provide a copy of documentation confirming your status as a temporary Foster Parent or provide your Veterans Affairs Pensioner Gold card to the school.

If you are seeking special consideration, mark this in the form and provide a copy of the relevant documentation.

- 2. Complete the STUDENT/S DETAILS section for students at this school.
- 3. Sign and date the form and return it to the school office as soon as possible. The CSEF program for 2023 closes on the 23 June 2023.
