# From the Principal Mrs Clare Monk

Dear families,

Firstly, thank you to members of our Warrnambool West community for their messages of condolences with the passing of my dear mum. Mothers have an incredible impact on our lives, and they influence who we are, our beliefs and moral compass as adults. I am very grateful that I was able to take leave from work to grieve and spend time with my immediate family and my fourteen siblings. Thanks to Karen Holdsworth for stepping into the acting principal role in my absence; it was reassuring knowing that the school was in very capable hands.

The end of our 2023 school year is fast approaching, with just over two weeks remaining until the end of the school year. The last weeks are always hectic as we finish one year and plan for another. It has been great to see the Year 5/6's students sharing more great times with each other during our surf program which commenced on Tuesday. These water safety lessons have focused on keeping safe at the beach, swimming between the flags and becoming aware of dangers such as rips. The program provides invaluable opportunities and experiences for students especially heading into Summer and supports children to understand that while water play is great fun, it can also be extremely dangerous. A friendly reminder that when you visit the beach (if the weather ever warms up), constant, vigilant supervision is paramount to keeping kids safe.

#### **Koorie Celebration Day**

A day of fun, tradition and culture was enjoyed by our year 3-6 Koorie students last Friday when they celebrated another year of learning and to acknowledge the year six graduation of Koorie students from our local schools. Graduating students received a small trophy to recognise seven years of primary education. Congratulations to Coen Kilpatrick on his graduation. Thanks to Woolsthorpe Primary School for hosting and Worn Gundidji for organising. Miss McElgunn attended the event with our

students and at the end of the day was beaming with pride about the exceptional behaviours of our students and the way they represented our school.

#### **Excursions**

As the year draws to a close it is fantastic to have our students out in the community enjoying the company of each other while exploring the wonderful places Warrnambool and district has on offer. Last week Learning Community one participating in some off-site learning about farm produce. They learnt lots about beekeeping from Ben and visited Volcanic Produce at Tower Hill harvesting cabbages to donate to FoodShare and picked (and ate) fresh strawberries. Tomorrow the learning continues as the students head of on a Paddock to Plate excursion. The students have an early start to their day with the buses leaving school at 7:30am to visit Kilpatrick's Farm at Southern Cross. Students will watch the cows getting milked, learn about cow nutrition, milk processing and taste some dairy food samples. I look forward to hearing all the stories from the students when they return to school at recess.

Other excursions include a swim and BBQ lunch at Aqua Zone for all students on 4<sup>th</sup> December. Learning Community 2 will also celebrate the end of the year with an excursion to Ten Pin Bowling and play at Lake Pertobe on December 6<sup>th</sup>. We ask that you continue to check COMPASS for excursion notifications as students will not be able to attend these excursions without signed parent consent which can be completed online.

### **Workforce Planning 2024**

Our planning for 2024 is well underway. The Leadership Team is fine tuning class organisation, teacher placement and numbers of classes that will fit within the Student Resource Package (SRP) which is the funding model provided by the Department of Education. The Department of Education provides funding for our school based on the number of students enrolled on 28 February 2024. Projecting the numbers of students in each class commences with the 2023 number of students and known new arrivals and departures. The number of classes is determined by the budget provided to the school to fund all teachers.

In 2024, all full-time teachers must be provided with 4 hours of non-face- to face teaching to attend to planning, preparing resources, assessing, administration, emails,

marking work and the many, many tasks and requirements teachers undertake in their very complex job.

Specialist classes for 2024 will be: Art, PE, STEM, Music/PMP (F-2 per semester) and Kitchen Garden (3-6). At this stage our LOTE program (AUSLAN) will continued to be offered as part of the classroom program.

We endeavour to maintain even class sizes for all levels with configurations that have an even spread of girls and boys and ability levels. If we know where numbers of enrolments will be or are leaving, we can do this in the most effective way possible. With **only 11 school days left** it's getting close to the end of the year. Last minute notification of families makes this really challenging so please advise if you know that you are moving.

Thank you to the families who have contacted the office already with this information. We also have new enrolments still coming in. At this time, we are closely tracking and monitoring the enrolments and will confirm the staffing with the community before the end of the year.

As the numbers of students at each year level impacts this organisation, we need to know how many students will have enrolled to make up each year's level and then how we can best organise grades and compositions.

#### The State-wide 'Step-up' Day

For all students in government schools is Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> December. Students will visit their new classroom for 2024 and spend the morning with their teacher before returning to their current classroom at 12:30pm. Year six students should have received confirmation of arrangements for their secondary school their transition days on the 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> of December. I encourage families to communicate directly with the secondary school if you have any questions or concerns.

### **Christmas Raffle**

We will be once again holding a Christmas Hamper raffle.

To assist with items for the hampers we ask that families donate non-perishable items using the theme of Christmas. Items can be left at the front office. Raffle books will be sent home tomorrow with the oldest child in the family, with the purchase price of \$1 per ticket or 6 tickets for \$5.00.

#### **Library Books**

Tomorrow will be the final day of class visits to the library. I ask that all borrowed books form the library be returned to school. We need all students to check under their beds, in the bookshelf and behind the couch for any books that they may have at home.

#### **Family Celebration**

To celebrate the end of another wonderful year at West, families are invited to school on Friday 15<sup>th</sup> December at 12 PM for our final assembly for 2023. Student of term awards will be presented, and families can watch students participate in a mini–Christmas Pageant. This is by no means a 'polished event' and has been organised to celebrate the end of the school year with a fun and laughter after a full year of learning. After the assembly, families are invited to bring along a rug and a picnic lunch to share with their children. Save the date and hope to see you there!

#### **Students last day of Attendance**

The last day of attendance for students will be Friday 15th December, this has been approved by School Council. Student testing for 2024 will be held on Monday 18th & Tuesday 19th December. Students will only be required to attend school for an hour on either of these days. More information will be sent home soon with appointment times.

### **Sleep Health for Students**

While we know sleep is essential for good health, research shows that many children and young people are not getting enough sleep on school nights. This can affect thinking, concentration, memory, reaction times and mood.

At Warrnambool West, we are advocates in promoting positive healthy routines with our students and this includes the links to our mental health, wellbeing and learning ability and sleep is the common denominator that links all three factors. Often, students come to school tired, explaining they had a late night or were up late watching TV or gaming. These habits do affect their energy, input and output while at school. So have a think, what routines do you have at home? Are these factors below indicating your child is not having enough sleep?

I encourage all parents to think about the signs that your child is demonstrating, where not getting enough sleep can include:

- low mood and irritability during social interactions
- reluctance or arguing about getting off devices and going to bed
- falling asleep during the day including class time!!
- difficulties waking up for school and sleeping in late on weekends to catch up
- changes to communicating or interacting at home.

You can help your child to improve their sleep by:

- establishing a regular sleep pattern and consistent bedtime routines
- supporting them to avoid using electronic devices such as smartphones before going to bed and in bed
- encouraging your child to exercise and spend time outside in daylight, but steering clear of vigorous activity in the hour before sleep
- encouraging them to wind down and relax before going to bed and again... avoiding screentime to 'wind' down.

Research shows about 12% of primary school-aged children don't get enough sleep on school nights. The recommended amount of time to sleep for primary school-aged children is 9 to 11 hours.

Researchers collected ongoing data in an ongoing Adolescent Brain Cognitive Development (ABCD) study. The researchers found that children in the insufficient sleep group at the start of the study had more mental health and behavioural challenges than those who got sufficient sleep. These included impulsivity, stress, depression, anxiety, aggressive behaviour, and thinking problems. The children with insufficient sleep also had impaired cognitive functions such as decision making, conflict solving, working memory, and learning.

If your child is still having trouble sleeping, has persistent problems with low mood, excessive daytime sleepiness, argumentative dispositions, low energy and showing a lack of interest in things they would normally get excited about, then it may be time to review bedtime routines and habits.

## Ukulele and Guitar

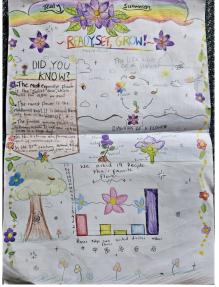

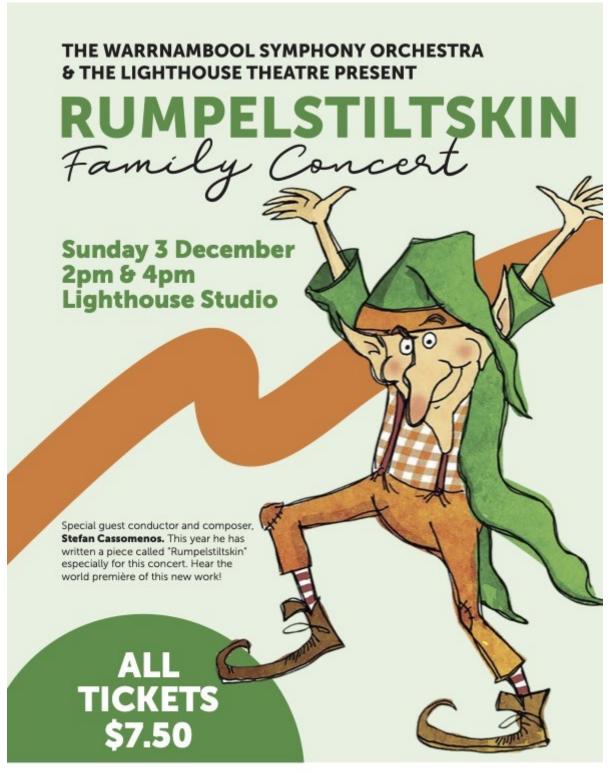
